

Welcome from the Chair and

Chief Executive

As we look forward to another year of compassion and care at Newcastle Dog & Cat Shelter, we are filled with immense gratitude for the unwavering support from our community. This past year has seen remarkable transformations, both in the lives of the animals we care for, and in our ability to reach out and connect with those who support our mission.

High Standards of Care

The quality of care we provide remains exemplary. We scored 94% on our inspection from the Association of Dog & Cat Homes (ADCH), highlighting the dedication and expertise of our team. This score is a great endorsement of the care we provide.

Our Financial Challenges

One of the significant challenges we faced this year was the difficult decision to mothball our admissions unit on Claremont Road. By bringing all our animal care and rehoming services under one roof at Benton North Farm, we have lowered site costs while ensuring the best possible care for the animals as staff are more flexible on one site.

Due to the presence of having newly admitted dogs on site, our rehoming centre at Benton North Farm has been closed to the public. We have noticed a considerable improvement in the wellbeing of our animals. This positive development suggests continuing to operate on an appointment basis which is beneficial for the animal's health and wellbeing.

Empowering Education and Awareness

Our commitment to community outreach has seen us take dogs to care homes and schools. Our work in schools is about educating children about animal welfare, and an exciting new school programme is in the pipeline. Meanwhile our Care Home Companions programme helps improve the health and wellbeing of older people in care, many of whom have had pets before in their personal lives. Research shows that as little as ten minutes spent with an animal can improve health and wellbeing, and work is being done to spread the joy only animals can bring.

Sustainable Income and Growth

We are grateful to everyone who supports the Shelter via our lottery and regular giving programme. This regular income stream is a lifeline for the Shelter, which we can depend on arriving with us each month, helping us to plan for the future.

Transformative Partnerships and Community Support

Our Troubled Tails appeal is a highlight over the past year, including an exciting new partnership with Herbal Dog Co, our first corporate supporter of the appeal. All monthly donations to the Troubled Tails Appeal help us care for animals. Support from Troubled Tails contributes towards critical vet treatments, bespoke training and rehoming services for animals like Milo and Ruby, whose stories of resilience and recovery inspire us all.

Looking Ahead: Capital Investments and Future Plans

While we are proud of our achievements over the past year, there are major challenges ahead. Our facilities require substantial capital investment, including new roofs, kennel blocks, and more urgently a new cattery. This redevelopment is a massive financial undertaking, and we will be seeking donations to support these essential upgrades.



Milo's Troubled Tail: Overcoming Fear and Pain

Milo, a blue Cane Corso puppy, arrived at Newcastle Dog & Cat Shelter completely shut down. With severe trauma to his mouth and a suspected history of neglect, Milo was found locked in a cupboard, terrified, cowering, and growling in fear. Physically and emotionally, he was in a state of distress.

We immediately assigned a staff member for Milo and placed him in a calm and quiet room away from other dogs, allowing him to relax and begin his recovery. We prioritised work on confidence and trust in people. Milo was petrified of everything and needed a slow process of socialisation to build up trust with humans. We also addressed his medical

needs, and he underwent a crucial operation performed by our vets, Blythman & Partners, to remove baby teeth that were broken and damaged due to severe trauma.


With gentle care and patience our staff member earned Milo's trust. Gradually, short introductions to other humans and animals helped him overcome his fears. Milo eventually learned to walk on a lead, climb stairs, and play with his newfound friend Nellie. After 51 days in our care, Milo was rehomed, leaving behind a troubled past for a future filled with love and joy.

Ruby's Troubled Tail: Resilient Despite Adversity

Ruby, a six-month-old tan Saluki x Greyhound, arrived at the Shelter with a broken leg. Her previous owners, unable to afford vet care, made the difficult decision to surrender her. X-rays revealed the leg had been broken for a period of time and had begun to heal incorrectly.

To relieve her pain and give her a chance at a better life with a quicker recovery, a difficult decision was made along with a veterinary professional, to amputate Ruby's leg. Within 24 hours of the surgery, Ruby was back to her usual self, running around with newfound freedom. Ruby is currently being fostered and continues to exemplify the strength and resilience of animals.

Troubled Tails:

Meet Our Heartwarming Rescues and Remarkable Rehomes

At Newcastle Dog & Cat Shelter, we often highlight the overlooked issue of rehoming black animals through stories like those of Coal and Flame, two kittens who survived a house fire, and Timmy, a senior cat whose journey of resilience has inspired many. Their stories reflect our purpose to care for and find loving homes for all animals.

Coal and Flame

Coal and Flame, black domestic short hair cats, arrived at our Shelter at 12-weeks-old after being rescued from a devastating house fire. Along with their siblings Blaze, Ember, and Flare, they faced longer wait times for adoption compared to their lighter-coated siblings. Despite their playful nature and loving personalities, the pair remained with us longer. Coal was rehomed after 32 days, while Flame recently found her forever home after nearly two months.

Black cats are often the last to be rehomed, partly due to superstitions and the difficulty in photographing them. Katie Fulcher-Watkins, Rehoming Assistant, notes, "Families often look for specific coat colours. Unfortunately, this means that pure black cats are often overlooked. Ginger cats, for instance, are highly sought after and often rehomed first."

Timmy's Troubled Tail

Timmy, a 17-year-old black cat, was the definition of resilience. He faced hyperthyroidism and a significant surgical procedure before he eventually passed away in his loving forever home. His legacy inspires our community to embrace the adoption of senior pets.

After Timmy was surrendered to us he was diagnosed with a lifelong thyroid condition. Despite his health battles and partial deafness, Timmy's unshakeable will to live captivated our hearts. During his recovery, he was fostered by a dedicated member of our Animal Care team, who helped him recover in a home environment.

After 155 days of care, Timmy found his forever home, where he was cherished. Matthew and Kelly, Timmy's adoptive parents, reflected: "Initially, we thought we were doing Timmy a favour, but it was he who enriched our lives immensely."

Matthew and Kelly feel extremely lucky they were able to spend Timmys twilight years with him whilst Timmy enjoyed making every corner of their home his own and his love for his favourite blankets and enjoyment of the finer things in life.

Millie, a striking 14-year-old black and white Appaloosa horse, had been with us for for almost five years. When she was finaly rehomed it was a joyful milestone for our team.

Phoebe, a 25-year-old black and white Piebald Cob, had an even longer stay, spending over nine years in our care. Despite the strong bonds we formed with her, it was clear a larger field and the companionship of other horses would provide a better quality of life.

Aimee Shorter, our Animal Welfare Manager, shared her joy on visiting the horses in their new home.

"Both girls are being little stars, they let us catch them and put their rugs on. They've already made a couple of little friends and both are standing up for themselves against any that try their luck. The field is massive and the herd is nice and small, so they've got loads of space. I'm thrilled to be just five minutes away from them, so I can see them all the time!"

Meet the animals that found their forever homes

The rehoming journey for every animal in our care is as different, special and unique as they are. Our small yet dedicated rehoming team work tirelessly to find the perfect fit for each animal looking for their forever home. The importance of finding the right fit for each animal can be echoed in stories like Skye's, who was featured in the last edition of Shelterlife, so it only seems fitting to update her story one year on.

Skye arrived with us March 2023 after struggling with separation anxiety, Skye had been selfmutilating and pulling her own fur out due to her stress when being left alone for any length of time. Initially when Skye arrived into our care, she deteriorated due to the stress of a new environment and began to fur pluck an even larger area, leaving herself with large scabs and severe bruising. Skye was quickly placed into a foster home with one of our dedicated team members, where she started on her road to recovery. This was to be key to Skye's success, with patience, routine and dedication from her amazing foster carer, Skye began to relax and heal and her bubbly personality shone through. As Skye continued to heal, she was signed off for rehoming 4 months after arriving with us. This was where our rehoming team stepped in to find Sykes next saviour and her forever home.

Skye's happy ever after was found in June 2023 when she found her fairy tale ending and at only 3 years old, she will be reaping the benefit for years to come. Skye's devoted new family could not do more for Skye to ensure her life is as comfortable and routine as necessary to continue to help Skye adapt to the world

and deal with her separation anxiety. Skye can regularly be found taking part in a Park Run on a Saturday with her new owner Lee, Skye has done as much for her new family as they have for Skye, being united in their dedication to providing the best life possible for Skye, the whole family have rallied together and are stronger than ever. Meeting new four-legged friends for Skye and their owners has widened everyone's world. A regular at their family BBQs where Skye is often the last one standing, she really is the centre of her family's world, even if she does enjoy digging holes in the lawn. Whilst Skye is living her best life she is also in the best condition of her life, with no obvious scarring or lasting damage from the injuries she caused herself, her coat is in amazing condition with no signs that Skye ever feels the need to harm herself again. From zoomies to sofa snuggles Skye really has it all!

This achievement is a testament to our commitment to providing comprehensive care and finding loving homes for every animal. Many of our animals need a little extra care and attention before they are ready to be rehomed. They can arrive in poor health or with behavioural issues that require attention. Our team works tirelessly to ensure that each animal receives the care they need, from medical treatments and surgeries to behavioural training and socialisation, ensuring they are fully prepared for their next chapter.



A Heartwarming Reunion: Ozzy's Journey Back Home

The Unexpected Visitor

Ozzy's story is wonderful but unusual, as he essentially rescued himself! He began visiting the Shelter as a young and friendly cat, who seemed to enjoy wandering around and eyeing up the farm cats' food. Ozzy became friends with our staff and volunteers and appeared to be hungry and in search of food. We decided to scan Ozzy for a microchip to see if he had an owner, as he appeared to be lost and discovered Ozzy did in fact have an owner and that he had been missing for three months.

A Happy Reunion

When his owners walked through the door to collect Ozzy there wasn't a dry eye in the house and the reunion was a happy and emotional occasion for everyone. It also turned out that Ozzy's owner worked as our local postman, so it seemed like Ozzy knew exactly where to come for help.

This reunion highlights the importance of microchipping and keeping details updated. Microchipping helps reunite pets with their owners and provides peace of mind. In 2024, a new law was introduced stating that all owned cats must be microchipped or face a potential fine of up to £500. Newcastle Dog & Cat Shelter supports the new legislation and stories like Ozzy's show exactly why we believe microchipping is important.

Anjuli Hakin, Head of Animal Welfare, explained: "A cat with a microchip has a much stronger chance of being promptly returned home than a cat without. But we urge owners to ensure their details are up-to-date, so we know how to find them."

What to Do With a Stray Cat

Encounters with stray cats are not uncommon and, while the instinct to help is natural, it's crucial to approach these situations with knowledge and care. There are some essential steps to take upon finding a stray cat, ensuring the well-being of both the cat and the community.

Before Labelling a Cat as Stray

Check for Identification: A quick way to determine if a cat is lost is to look for an identification tag or to have them scanned for a microchip at a local vet, which can provide details about the owner.

Assess the Cat's Health: Well-groomed cats of a healthy weight are likely to have a home nearby, while a distinctly unkempt appearance may suggest they're lost or stray.

Feeding Stray Cats: A Cautionary Note

The Shelter advises against feeding unfamiliar cats, as it may discourage them from returning to their homes and could inadvertently cause dietary issues.

Identifying Feral vs. Stray Cats

Understanding the difference between a feral and a stray cat is critical. Feral cats, often wary and unapproachable, are best left undisturbed, while strays may appear lost but can become friendly over time.



Additional Tips for Handling Stray Cats If you suspect the cat is pregnant:

- Check the cat's tummy, carefully and without startling them (or touching their tummy) – if the mammary glands appear more prominent, the cat may be still nursing her young
- Take the cat to the vet by safely wrapping them in a blanket or putting them in a cardboard box. The vet will be able to scan for a microchip, which is vital in locating an owner and may also lead to finding the location of any kittens
- If safe to do so, go back to the area where the cat was found and have a look around the area for any signs of kittens. Check under bushes and shrubs, and listen out for their cries

If you suspect the cat is injured:

If you have found an injured cat and you have a secure cat carrier and the cat will let you, you could take the cat to a vet. You may like to call them first to check they will offer this service for free.

Shelter Myth Busters

With online misinformation a common issue in modern times, the following section aims to bust some common myths about rehoming or owning a rescue animal:

"You can't adopt if you have children or other animals."

We rehome pets to families with children and other animals. The key is finding the right match, considering the animal's temperament and household dynamics listed on their profile.

"You can't adopt if you live in a flat or have a small garden/yard."

While some pets need more space, many thrive in smaller homes with the right care and exercise.

"All animals from rescue centres have been mistreated."

Not all of our animals have been mistreated. Many end up here due to changes in their owners' circumstances. Our rescue pets can be loving and well-adjusted with a stable environment.

"I was turned down to adopt because I work full time."

Full-time employment doesn't disqualify you from adopting. Ensure your pet's well-being during your absence with options like pet sitters or dog walkers.

"I can't adopt because I don't have a 6ft fence."

Not all dogs need a 6ft fence. The requirement depends on the dog's size and athleticism.

"All rescue dogs are old."

We care for dogs of all ages, from puppies to seniors. Potential adopters can find a companion that fits their lifestyle.

"All animals that aren't reclaimed/ rehomed after a certain time period are euthanised."

Euthanasia is only ever considered for animals with untreatable health issues, severe behavioural problems or banned breeds. Our mission is to rehome every animal in our care.

"Animals that can't live with children are aggressive and dangerous."

Not all dogs that can't live with children are aggressive. Reasons include fear, resource guarding, health concerns, or lack of socialisation. Proper training and understanding can help these dogs thrive.

"Rescue centres are too expensive."

Adoption fees cover medical treatment, neutering, microchipping, and vaccinations, making it cost-effective compared to private pet acquisition. Fees support our operations but do not cover all of our costs.

"I don't need to microchip my pet as it doesn't go outside."

Microchipping dogs and cats is now a legal requirement. It means they can be identified and reunited with their owners if they escape or get lost.

Shelter Dreams

At Newcastle Dog & Cat Shelter, we have a variety of projects that we'd like to complete, ranging from improving our facilities to implementing more pet educational programmes, and companion visits to those who would benefit. However we need funds to do this. We will leave some information below about a few of our "Shelter Dreams" and thank those that supported this section last year, any donations have been restricted for this purpose.

New Kennels

We are experiencing an increase in the number of enquiries from owners who can no longer look after their dogs. To combat this, we are looking to build some additional kennels so that we can help more dogs in need. We'd also love to be able to build some additional exercise pens so that our dogs can burn off more of their energy to help them settle in the kennel environment.

New Cattery

In our most recent inspection from the Association of Dog & Cat Homes we are very proud to have scored 94% showing the outstanding quality of our care. Sadly one area that was marked for improvement is

our cattery, which is deemed to be not of a modern standard. A new cattery is a long term goal for the Shelter, and funding is being sought to help raise the majority of the capital funds required to undertake this. Our future dream is to have a new cattery to help us accomodate and care for our cats in a more modern setting.

Energy efficiency and heating

Thanks to the kind generosity of its local community, the Shelter now has a number of solar panels on the dog main block roof, and discussions are under way to secure batteries. We are extremely grateful to GEC Power who arranged and paid for the installation and to Electrical Solutions NE who provided all the of the solar panels and kit free of charge. This is a massive leap in improving energy efficiency at the Shelter but more work could be done to improve our boilers and take away some of the maintenance headaches that are experienced during the winter period.

cuddling on his new family's laps.


Darwin's story highlights that there is a perfect home for every animal, and with your support, we can help more animals like him find their forever homes too.
